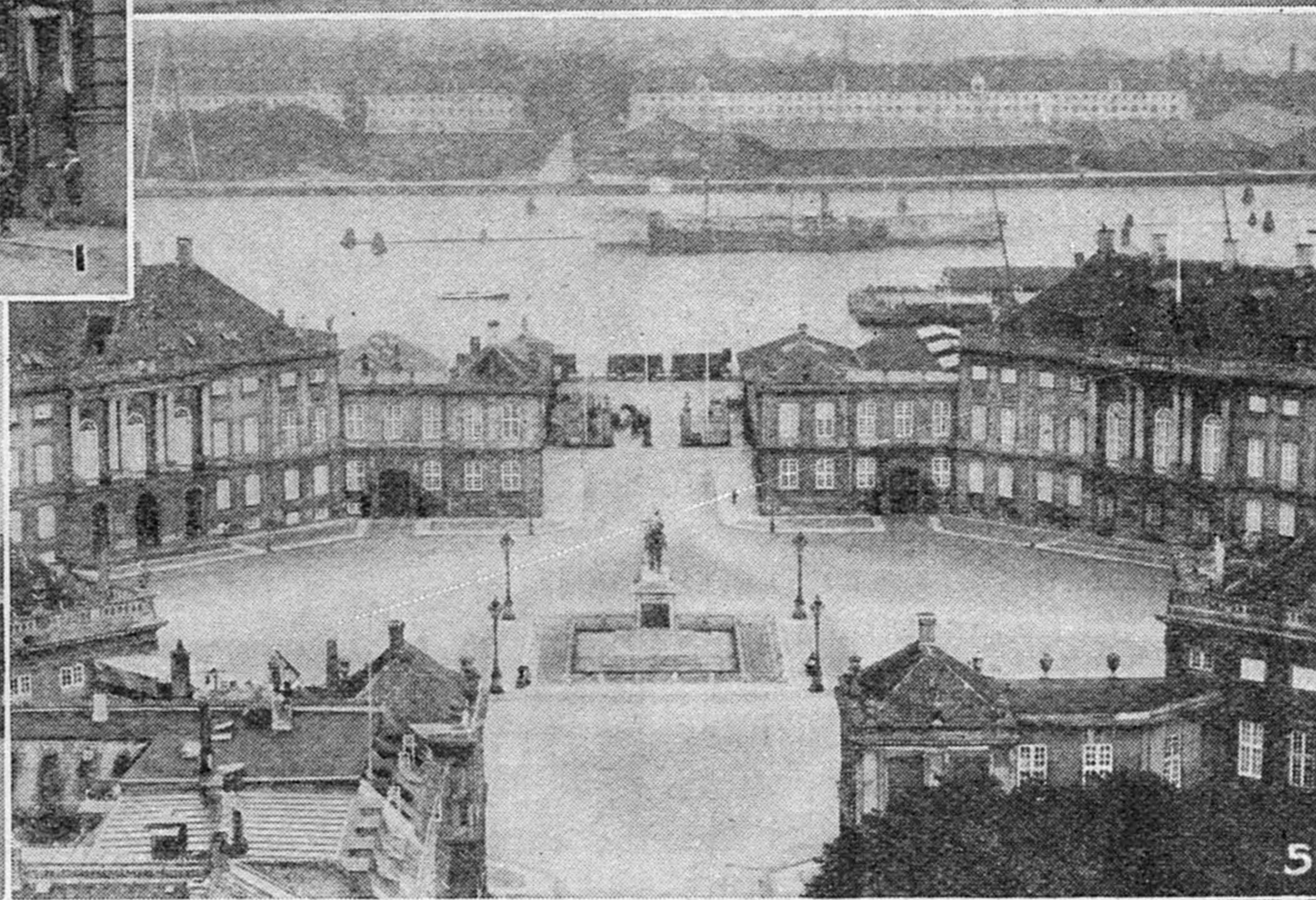
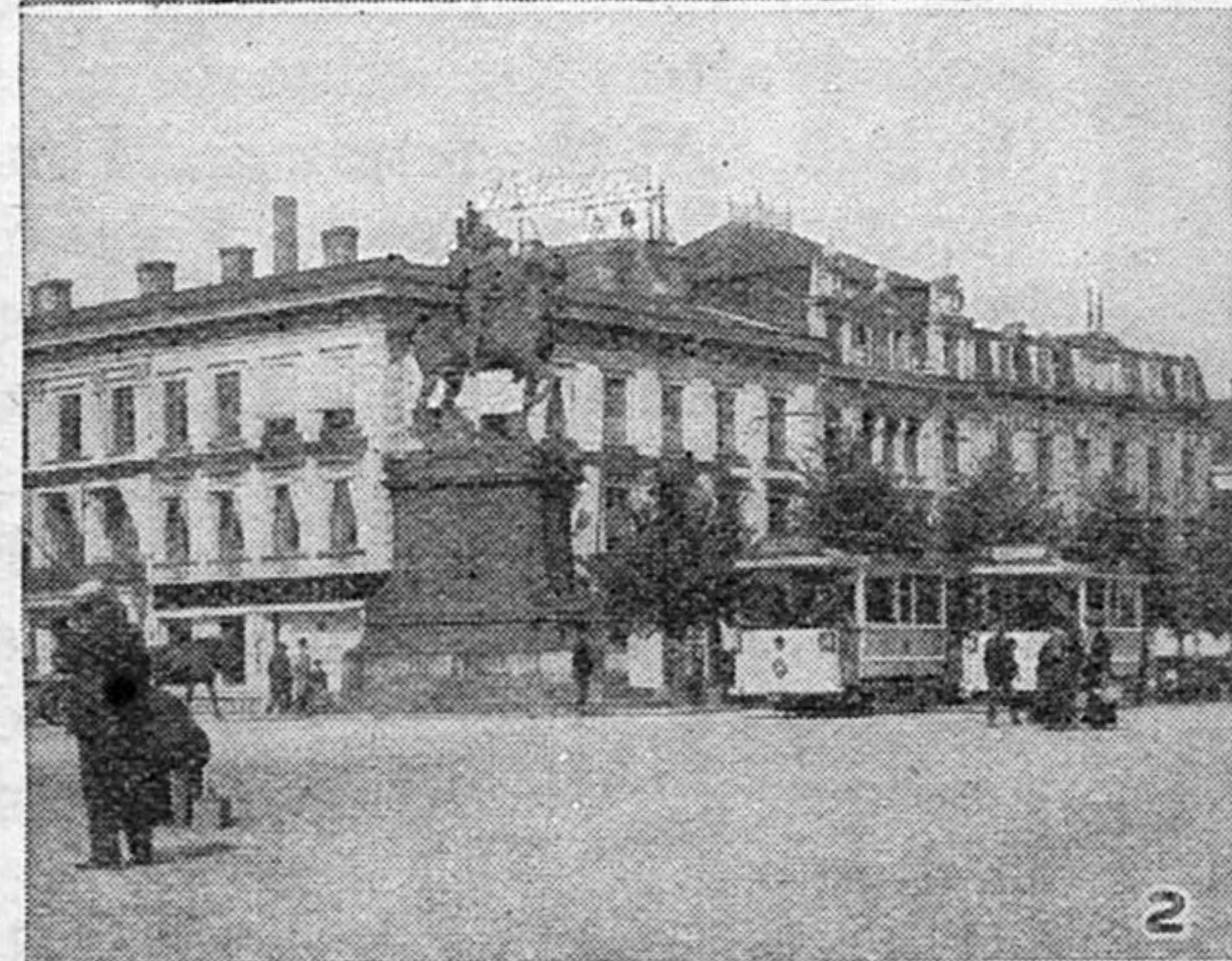
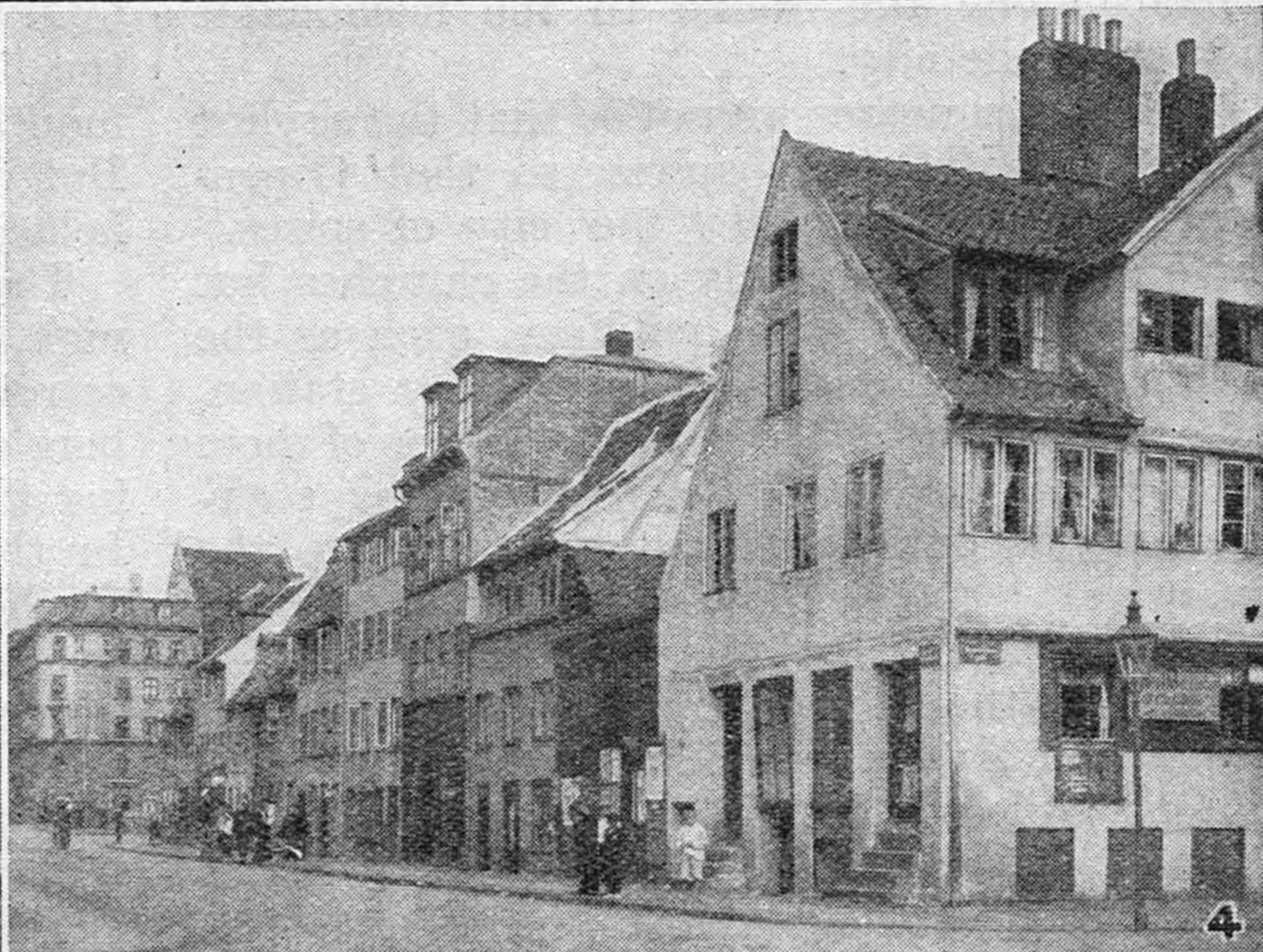


SEEING THE SIGHTS IN COPENHAGEN



If you ever visit Copenhagen, perhaps the thing you will talk most about to the folk at home when you get back is that curious tower rising above the Church of Our Saviour (1). It was built in 1696, and is 288 feet high. The steps run round the outside in corkscrew fashion, tapering off to a point at the top. Next you might mention that you had seen the famous leaden statue of Christian V in the King's Market (2). At another market-place (3) you get nice fresh vegetables from the island of Amager, where the gardening is done for the city markets. In the next picture (4) you are looking at some of the quaint houses of olden days which are still plentiful in this fine old city. Below that (5) you get a good view of the Palace and the Palace grounds. You end this tour by feeding the pigeons in the public park. They will gladly eat out of your hand, too, just as they are eating out of the hands of those young Danish children.
